## A Word from Our Pastor:

Welcome to October and the celebration of the Reformation! It is appropriate this month to think about the significance of Luther and the German Reformation.

A quick internet search will relate some of the reasons why Lutherans are so unique:

- Lutherans are the ones who during communion hum the hymns so that they can see who is attending church.
- Lutherans are the ones who forget to water their plants, but who would never forget to put water in the coffee pot.
- Lutherans are the ones who would rather not introduce themselves to a visitor at church, but check out their name in the guestbook.
- Lutherans are the ones who respond to someone jumping up and shouting, "Praise the Lord!" by politely reminding the person that something like that shouldn't happen at church.
- Lutherans are the ones who would run into a burning church just to save the coffee pot.

Many of these statements could not be any more true. Just recently Peace faced the terrible dilemma of going without coffee on one Sunday when the old coffee maker went caput. I remem-

ber hearing one person say, "What are we going to do? Can we have church without coffee?" Everyone should know that the great dilemma was solved when a new coffee pot was ordered and delivery was guaranteed just in the nick of time before Sunday's service.



I would like, however, to add one more unique aspect of Lutherans. Lutherans are ones who live without fear.

It is hard to believe that living without fear was a teaching of Martin Luther as he was filled with great personal fear early on in his life. Luther feared his parents—growing up in a very strict German home, Luther watched carefully every step he made. Luther feared God—worshipping every Sunday, Luther heard sermons that highlighted God's wrath and vengeance over and above God's love. During Luther's day, the common people were not encouraged to read the Bible. They were asked to think solely upon God's judgment.

In prayerful study Luther took to heart the meaning of Romans 1:16, "I AM NOT AFRAID of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes....." To say that Luther lived without fear after that moment would be an understatement. He believed and knew in his

heart that God would not punish him, but would welcome him into His kingdom. Great confidence replaced fear. One of my favorite quotes of Luther expresses that new outlook: "faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that a man could stake his life on it a thousand times."

We too share Luther's outlook. That is why we celebrate the Reformation. You have nothing to fear. God's love for you overcomes any of the negative messages that are sent your way by the world. God's commitment to you is so great, not even death can separate you from Him. God's plan for you is so sure, you can count on goodness even when road blocks appear in life. God's church too is on solid footing. His promise was and is that the gates of Hades will never overcome it.

Give thanks this month for Jello molds, casseroles, coffee pots and potlucks—all good Lutheran staples. Give thanks too for the clarification Luther brought with his understanding of the gospel. With God on our side, we have nothing to fear!
