A Word from Our Pastor:

Dear Friends,

I hope you are enjoying our walk through the book of Job this season of Lent. It has been even more special as we have partnered with Shepherd of the Valley and Immanuel in our study together. I am very thankful that although Job includes great suffering, personal hardship, and loss, the story of Job ends with this great statement of hope: "I know that my redeemer lives!"

Please come and invite your friends to Peace for a joyful celebration on Easter day—our worship begins at 10 am with the Easter egg hunt to begin approximately at 12:15. To close out our season of Lent and usher in a great time of celebration we will be singing the famous Easter hymn "I Know that My Redeemer Lives".

In the meantime, there are some very down to earth, practical techniques that we can use to assist people who are experiencing intense suffering. What can we do? The suggestions below are points made by Reed Lessing (professor at the Concordia Seminary) that I think are quite helpful:

Show up. Our instincts often are to stand on the sidelines and let things go their natural way. We may think that we do not really have anything profound to say or contribute. In fact it would be better if we just show up and remain silent. I once heard someone explain ministry this way, "Ministry is 90 percent presence."

Consider the friends of Job. It was excellent when they showed up to console Job. It was a disaster when they started speaking and offering explanations for what was happening in his life.

Share their pain. This does not mean that we compare our situation to theirs. I remember when a relative passed away and one of my friends tried to

console me this way, "Jeremy, when my father passed away, it took me about six months to be over the loss. Just hold on and you will get over your loss too." This wasn't very helpful. To console by comparing does not work. Every person's situation is different. And everyone grieves in different ways.

Consider Job once again. Job needed a shoulder to cry. The opposite happens. When Job's friends visit they make the suggestion that he should have suffered more (Job 11:6)! They would have done better if they simply dropped off a note sharing their concern.

Take the initiative. Lessing explains:

When you have a friend who's in shock, you take the initiative. Don't say, "Call me if you need anything." That's not helpful to somebody in shock. Because now they've got to work to get your help. Don't even say, "How can I help?" Because when somebody's in shock, they haven't the slightest idea how we can help. When somebody's in shock they are numb. They are paralyzed......What you do want to do is give people options. Say, "I'd like to bring you dinner, will Wednesday or Thursday night work best? Call them and say, "I'm going to the store, what can I pick up for you?

Make Easter a special time this year. Yes.....we are going to sing great words of praise as we celebrate what Jesus has done for us! Yes, we will gather for ham and all the fixings. We can also make Easter special by just being a good friend to someone that needs us.

I look forward to our celebration together!

Why Do We Do That?

Each month we are dedicating space in our newsletter to explore the reasons why we do certain things in our worship. This week, I would like to share with you the reason why we confess our sins—this part of the service is called "confession", sometimes we call it, "being open to God".

Let me begin by saying that it would be quite awkward NOT having confession in a Christian worship service. Why do I say that? The Christian Church from its very inception has taught that confession—admitting our sins and sinful condition—is the primary way to express our need for Jesus, our Savior. Without the confession of sins, a worship could be inspirational......it could be uplifting......it could be intellectually stimulating, but it would likely miss the point.

We must admit that we need a Savior. Above all else, worship should make this clear.

The best part about our confession time at church is that God does not delay with His forgiveness. God does not expect us to clean up our ways and then forgiveness can be granted. God does not want us to live with guilt wondering whether we have been forgiven. The immediate response to our confession in worship is ALWAYS God's forgiveness.

Consider the promise found in I John, "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God, who is faithful and just, will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness." When we confess our sins, I would like you to think that we are doing nothing more than living out what this Bible passage says.



I am so thankful we confess our sins each week—I wouldn't want to do it any other way. I am so thankful to have a Savior who rescues.
