### A Word from Our Pastor:

Dear Family of Peace,

We are quickly approaching the beginning of the Lent season. Ash Wednesday is March 1 marking the start of an over forty day journey to Easter. Some of you may be asking, "What is Lent?" Others, may be wondering, "Why do we still observe this season at Peace?"

Lent has been a special time of preparation for Christians. In the times of the early church, Lent was a time of teaching those who would soon be baptized. The teaching would conclude shortly before Easter and then the students would be baptized during the Easter Vigil service. For those already baptized, Lent served as a time of faith strengthening. The time for prayer and meditation became more focused on the passion of Jesus and the forgiveness it offered.

As you well know, times of preparation tend to be a little more serious. This last summer Alicia and I participated in a fast-like experience. For twenty-four days we became very serious about the food and drink we consumed. No sugar. Little bread. No red meat. No coffee. No soda. And worst of all, no ice cream. As you read this list, you might be thinking and be wanting to add, "No fun!" The twenty-four days was undoubtedly upsetting and challenging. On day twenty-five, however, having gone through this serious time of preparation, we felt much better and thankful for the good health the Lord had blessed us with.

Lent has a sense of seriousness. We want to end up on Easter morning, after our over forty day journey, saying, "Thank you, Lord, for Your sacrifice and the eternal life it offers me!"

Consider some of these common traditions practiced in the Christian Church during Lent:

- The word "Alleluia" is not to be sung or spoken in worship.
- Many churches observe the custom of not placing flowers on the altar (or anywhere in the church).
- Musical instruments are used in a limited fashion. Some churches even refrain from the ringing of the bell to begin worship.

Peace does not observe all of the common practices associated with Lent. Yet, we do observe some of them and we do observe Lent as a vital time for individual faith strengthening and growth. Each Wednesday night (beginning March 1) we will gather for soup supper (6 PM) with a brief worship service to follow at 7 PM. Set this time aside to grow and reflect upon the miracle of Jesus' work for you. Use the schedule below as you prepare for each evening.

- Ash Wednesday, March 1: The Miraculous Darkness (Matthew 27:45)
- March 8: The Miraculous Tearing of the Temple Curtain (Matthew 27:51a)
- March 15: The Miraculous Earthquake (Matthew 27:51b)
- March 22: The Miracle of the Splitting Rocks (Matthew 27:51c)
- March 29: The Miraculous Raising of the Saints from Death (Matthew 27:52-53)
- April 5: The Miraculous Faith of the Roman Soldiers (Matthew 27:54)
- Maundy Thursday, April 13: The Miraculous in Holy Communion (I Corinthians 11:23-29)
- Good Friday, April 14: The Miracle of Good Friday (I Peter 3:18)
- Easter Sunday, April 16: The Miracle of Easter (Matthew 28:1-10)

Lent is serious. It should be. We had a Savior who was very serious about our eternal destiny. His sacrifice has made all the difference in the world for our future.

## **Easter Celebration Important Information**

Although Easter isn't until April 16th there is planning going on already to ensure this important date is an uplifting celebration. Here are some important reminders:

- Palm Sunday is April 9. It is the first day of Holy Week. Everyone will receive a palm. The palms are placed in vases at the front of the church during the first hymn. This tradition commemorates the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem in the days before his suffering and death on the cross.
- Easter is April 16th. Church will begin at 10:00 that day with no Sunday school. An Easter egg hunt will follow at 11:15 for all of the children.
- ⊕ Each year a wooden cross is placed at the entrance to the church and it is decorated with cut flowers. We request people to bring cut flowers to help decorate the cross prior to Easter Sunday. Be looking in your yard and think about contributing flowers.
- The altar and the area in front of the altar are also decorated, only with Easter lilies. If you have an Easter lily, please bring it to help fill the front of the church with beautiful lilies.
- Plastic eggs will be available for people to take home and fill with goodies for the Easter egg hunt. Candy, stickers, money, anything fun that can fit in an egg.
- If you contribute to Fellowship Easter Sunday, please bring finger foods only as everyone wants to get home that day to be with family and friends. We try to make it an easy cleanup day.
- Last, and very important, is our church cleanup day. That day will be April 8th. We will be cleaning the church inside and out. There will be a list of jobs that need to be done and you can choose where you would like to work and what you would like to do. Many hands make light work!
